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
## MLK “Wheels to Work” program Annual Ceremony

On June 18, 2021 the Martin Luther King Economic Development Corporation (MLKEDC) joined by Miami Dade County District 3 Commissioner Keon Hardemon in awarding recipients of the Wheels to Work program the titles to their cars after the successful completion of the program's requirements. The Wheels to Work Program was first funded by Miami-Dade County Commissioner **Keon Hardemon** when he was the District 5 City of Miami Commissioner as part of an anti-poverty initiative. The program assists low-income persons with obtaining a vehicle for school and job preparedness. Participants must complete training workshops and community service over a period of 36 months to receive full ownership of the cars. **Ms. Christine King**, President and CEO of MLKEDC, explained that lack of credit history or poor credit can make vehicle ownership an otherwise unattainable goal for most low income families. According to Luis DeRosa, Puerto Rican Chamber the wheels to work program has assisted many Hispanic and Puerto Rican families realize of their dream of a car ownership.

People from Puerto Rico have been traveling to Miami for more than a century. The island became a US territory in 1898, and Islanders became US citizens in 1917. Throughout the 20th century, Puerto Ricans have established communities across Miami-Dade County. They have come as farm workers, garment workers, bankers and investors, or as US service members. By the 1950s, the Puerto Rican community in Miami was strong and diverse. The first Hispanic Mayor in Miami was Puerto Rican Maurice Ferre. “Boricuas in the Magic City: Puerto Ricans in Miami” is a photographic voyage through the history of Miami and its Puerto Rican community. "Boricua" is a term of endearment that Puerto Ricans call themselves that identifies them with the precolonial period when the native Tainos referred to the island as Boriken.
